Alzheimer's Disease and Dementia

We hear much in the news about Alzheimer's and Dementia, yet most of us do not understand it or know much about it. Dementia is a problem in the brain that makes it hard for a person to remember, learn and communicate. After a while, this makes it hard for the person to take care of himself or herself. Dementia may also change a person's mood and personality. At first, memory loss and trouble thinking clearly may bother the person who has dementia. Later, disruptive behavior and other problems may start. The person who has dementia may not be aware of these problems. Dementia is caused by the destruction of brain cells. Once brain cells have been destroyed, they cannot be replaced. It is marked by symptoms of dementia that gradually get worse over time. Alzheimer's disease first affects the part of the brain associated with learning, so early symptoms often include changes in memory, thinking and reasoning skills. While dementia is a general term, Alzheimer's disease is a specific brain disease.

Signs of Dementia

Dementia causes many problems for the person who has it and for the person's family. Many of the problems are caused by memory loss. Some common signs of dementia are:

- * Recent memory loss-At times all of us will forget things but then remember them later. People with dementia often forget things but never remember them. They might ask the same question over and over, each time forgetting that you've already given them the answer. They won't even remember that they already asked the question.
- * Difficulty performing familiar tasks-People with dementia might cook a meal but forget to serve it. They might even forget that they cooked it in the first place.
- * Problems with language-People who have dementia may forget simple words or use the wrong words. This makes it hard to understand what they want.
- * Time and disorientation-People who suffer from dementia may get lost on their own street. They may forget how they got to a certain place and how to get back home.

Creation Care - "Nature Isn't a Resource—It's a Gift" | Robin Wall Kimmerer (by Jaimy Suydam)

"Recognizing "**enoughness**" is a radical act in an economy that is always urging us to consume more." — Robin Wall Kimmerer, <u>The Serviceberry: Abundance and Reciprocity in the Natural World</u>

Robin Wall Kimmerer's short, delicious book, *The Serviceberry*—just 105 pages—is about a lot more than serviceberries. She invites readers to reflect on the generosity of the natural world, her example the serviceberry that produces an abundance of delicious fruit that it freely shares with birds and humans. Serviceberries were part of the gift economy practiced by Native Americans before the coming of European settlers.

According to Robin Kimmerer the rules for a gift economy are not written down but might be as follows:

- Know the ways of the ones who take care of you so you can take care of them.
- Introduce yourself; be accountable as the one who comes asking for a life.
- Ask permission before taking, abide by the answer.
- Never take the first one; never take the last.
- Take only what you need.
- Take only that which is given.
- Never take more than half. Leave some for others.
- Harvest in a way that minimizes harm.
- Use it respectfully.
- Never waste what is taken.
- Share.

...Alzheimers (continued from page 3) More Signs of Dementia

In our society of longer lifetimes, the probability of suffering from dementia increases with advancing age. The slowly progressing destruction of nerve cells in the brain leads to the following symptoms:

- * Poor judgement-Even a person who doesn't have dementia might get distracted but people with dementia can forget simple things like forgetting to put on a coat before going out in cold weather.
- * Problems with abstract thinking-Anybody might have trouble balancing a checkbook, but people who have dementia may forget what the numbers are and what has to be done with them.
- * Misplacing things-People who have dementia may put things in wrong places. They might put an iron in the freezer or a wristwatch in the sugar bowl, they are unable to find these things later.
- * Changes in mood-Everyone is moody at times, but people with dementia may have fast mood swings, going from calm to tears to anger in a few minutes.

There is no cure for dementia, but medications can improve disease symptoms. If you or a family member have signs of dementia, get help by calling your doctor. Your doctor can do simple tests to find out if these signs are caused by dementia. or speaking with me or the Alzheimer's Association.

May we share the confidence of St. Paul "...And we know in all things God works for the good of those who love Him...If God is for us, who can be against us. No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us(Romans 8:28-37)
