HEARING LOSS: A COMMON PROBLEM FOR OLDER ADULTS

Hearing Loss Is A Common Problem caused by noise, aging, disease, and heredity. People with hearing loss can find it hard to have conversations with other people. Nearly one in three people between the ages of 65 and 74 has hearing loss. Nearly half of people older than 75 have difficulty hearing. This can cause depression or withdrawal from others as people feel frustrated or embarrassed about not understanding what is being said. Cognitive abilities (including memory and concentration) decline faster in older adults with hearing loss. Treating hearing problems may be important for cognitive health.

Signs of Hearing Loss

You should see your doctor if you

- * Have trouble hearing over the telephone
- *Find it hard to follow conversations when two or more people are talking
- * Often ask people to repeat what they are saying
- * Need to turn up the TV or radio volume so loud that others complain
- * Have a problem hearing because of background noise
- * Think that others seem to mumble
- * Can't understand when women and children speak to you

Types of Hearing Loss

There are two general categories of hearing loss-

- * Sensorineural hearing loss occurs when there is damage to the inner ear or the auditory nerve. This type of hearing loss is usually permanent.
- * Conductive hearing loss occurs when sound waves cannot reach the inner ear. The cause may be wax buildup, fluid, or a punctured eardrum. Medical treatment or surgery can usually restore conductive hearing loss.

Sudden Hearing Loss- is a rapid loss of hearing that can happen to a person all at once or over a period of up to 3 days. You should visit a doctor immediately if this occurs.

Age-Related hearing Loss- comes on gradually as a person ages. It seems to run in families and can occur due to changes in the inner ear and auditory nerve. Age related hearing loss usually occurs in both ears and is a gradual loss of hearing.

Ringing in the Ears (Tinnitus)- is also common in older people. It is typically described as ringing in the ears but can also sound like roaring, clicking, hissing, or buzzing. It can be intermittent, can be heard in one or both ears, and may be loud or soft. Tinnitus can also be a sign of other health problems such as high blood pressure, allergies, or a side effect of medications.

Causes of Hearing Loss

Loud noise is one of the most common causes of hearing loss. Loud noise also contributes to tinnitus. You can prevent most noise related hearing loss by turning down the sound on your radio, television, or headphones. Move away from loud noise or use earplugs or the ear protection to protect yourself.

Earwax or fluid buildup can block sounds carried from the eardrum to the inner ear. If wax blockage is a problem your doctor may suggest mild treatments to soften earwax.

Creation Care News

It's time to prepare for winter. Some of the following can/should be done now and some may have to wait, but make a list:

- Make sure that your furnace is running properly and efficiently. Have it checked professionally to avoid emergencies.
- Add any insulation that you had been promising to add.
- Caulk around windows as needed. Don't forget the basement windows.
- Before it freezes, drain the water lines that are exposed to the outside; that might include hoses. Frozen pipes and hoses can cause a lot of expensive and wasteful damage.

A punctured ear drum can also cause hearing loss. The eardrum may be damaged by infection, pressure, or putting objects in the ear, including cotton swabs. See you doctor if you have pain or fluid draining from the ear.

Health conditions such as diabetes or high blood pressure can contribute to hearing loss. Other causes can be viruses, bacteria, a heart condition, stroke, brain injury or a tumor.

Hearing loss can also result from taking certain ototoxic medications used to treat serious infections, cancer and heart disease. Sometimes antibiotics are also ototoxic. Check with your doctor if you notice a problem while taking a medication.

Heredity can cause hearing loss as well. Not all forms of hearing loss take place at birth. Some forms show up later in life.

How to Cope with Hearing Loss

If you notice signs of hearing loss, talk to your doctor. if you have trouble hearing, you should:

- * Let people know you have a hearing problem
- * Ask people to face you and to speak more slowly and clearly.
- * Pay attention to what is being said and to facial expressions or gestures
- * Let the person know if you don't understand what was said
- * Find a good location to listen

The most important thing you can do if you think you have a hearing problem is to seek professional advice. Your family doctor may be able to diagnose and treat your hearing problem or refer you to other experts, like an otolaryngologist or audiologist.

Devices to Help with Hearing Loss

Your doctor or specialist may suggest you get a hearing aid. Assistive-listening devices and cochlear implants can help some people with hearing loss. Cochlear implants are electronic devices for people with severe hearing loss. Alert systems can work with doorbells, smoke detectors and alarm clocks to send you visual signals or vibrations. Talk with your doctor about what is right for you. You can learn more about hearing loss from the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders (www.nidcd.nih.gov).
